Redeemed Vocational School

Lead me by your truth and teach me, for you are the God who saves me. All day long I put my hope in you. Psalms 25:5

Our only hope continues to be in God. Every day we humans make this world a messier place to live in. This has been a rather depressing newsletter to write. Life here in Haiti has not improved. Some things are about the same and some things are more complicated.....

The gang situation in Haiti remains unchanged. They still control the road to Port and anyone passing through pays for the 'privilege' if they're lucky enough not to be kidnapped. Everything is expensive and difficult, and everyone is trying to leave.

For the past 2 years we've done most of our shopping in Santo Domingo: Car parts, food, school supplies, etc...... however, in September the Dominican government closed their borders to Haiti. They said it was in protest of an irrigation canal that Haiti is building for a river that originates in the DR and passes into Haiti. I'm not sure if they think their water levels will be affected or if they think Haiti won't buy as much produce from them if they arow more of their own. I tend to think that it served as more of an excuse to deport Haitians than an actual reason for the border closures. (Relations between the DR and Haiti have been strained for a long time. Many Haitians are living there illegally, but to be fair, the DR makes it impossible for most Haitians to fulfill their visa requirements. A visa can cost up to \$800 US dollars, is only good for one year, and requires you to stamp back into Haiti every thirty days. Dominicans are a warm and welcoming people, but they are also





capable of extreme racism. The most chilling example I've seen is watching them laugh and make fun of the trucks full of Haitians being deported. It's an unsettling experience.) The DR reopened their border after almost a month, but they only welcome Haitians to come buy from them and that's it. Haiti retaliated by closing their border until the DR agrees to a more 'normal' agreement. And so, we are at an impasse..... waiting to see who wins this 'stare down'. Personally, I think Haiti should hold out for 5-year visas and 6-month entry stamps.

Since the border closure we've been making a ten-hour trip over extreme mountain roads to Jacmel for all our banking and shopping needs. In some ways it's easier, (I only have 1 currency to deal with instead of 3) but it's a super exhausting trip.

On much lighter note. а Redeemed Vocational School had an excellent year. We graduated a hundred students in September. Graduation is always a huge blessing - it's a chance to celebrate with our students and appreciate everything they've learned and accomplished. Attendance was probably at least twice as much as last year. ľm quessing maybe 1000 people attended, and every vehicle in our small town was there. It was a little overwhelming to see just how many lives our little school has touched.

Rejoice with us for every blessing God has poured out on us and pray for our country. Pray for Peace and for a competent and fair government.

Journey into Significance Conference

In our search for meaning and purpose in life we often find ourselves turning to the wrong sources, filling our minds and bodies with various substances and activities to fit in with our peers, fix ourselves, mask pain, avoid truth, escape from reality, or indulge our lusts; but never attaining the lasting satisfaction and true peace which is only found through the healing power of Jesus Christ. The pitfalls and temptations associated with our increasingly connected world are being felt in Ghana as well as in the rest of the world and social media has taken peer pressure to an entirely new level.

With your funds LMI was able to support a program that facilitated a conference for junior high and senior high graduates and dropouts. The conference provided a platform of trust for those already addicted to seek help from the facilitators (speakers) and other professionals. Teaching was giving on how the youth can avoid negative peer influence and equiped them to be able to influence others with good virtues. The importance of taking academic work seriously was stressed. It created a space for them to strengthen their relationship with our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. A sampling of the topics used at the Journey into Significance conference: Born of God, Identity and Self-worth, Time Management, Peer Pressure and Sexuality, Substance and Drug Developing Leadership Abuse. Principles and more.

One of the facilitators wrote: "With my experience as a youth Pastor for close to two decades, I realized most of the children who get into various addictions fall within the range of children entering either the high school or universities. I have seen very great kids with wonderful talents turning out to be serious drug and sex addicts. This bleeds the heart of many parents and other significant others who have higher expectations



for their wards as they go higher in the education ladder. This is always the case because parents and significant others spend a lot of time providing for the physical needs of these children neglecting the cultivation of verv important virtues that will help these younger ones to make productive



decisions as they face new people and new environments with different challenges and temptations. Apart from the afore mentioned, the rate of addiction defense rolling on social media erases the guilt of addiction thereby drawing many including Christian young folks.

These and many others inspired idea of the Journey the into Significance conference. The BIG question was how to equip our youth in the churches who fall within the scope of this program to be able to stand the many temptations they are bound to face at higher levels of education and also how we can use them as significance ambassadors to also impart to their peers positively in any education institution they happen to find themselves. Even though we are looking at negative peer influence combat, the information this conference looks at communicating will be useful at all settings of life."

It was encouraging to see some

of the participants approach the facilitators and confide in them some of the dangerous addictions they were battling. The youth had one-on-one interactions with the facilitators who identified those that had good standards and committed to good living, those who are facing the temptation of going the wrong way because of situations and environment, and those who have serious addictions and need help to reform. At the end of the conference they were scheduled for follow-up counselling. The youth who had high school experiences shared their testimonies with the junior high graduates and were able to encourage each other.

Pray that today's youth in every nation would grow in the knowledge of Jesus Christ and the strength of the Lord; rising up as faithful servants and courageous warriors in the kingdom of God.

"That's what Caro asked, too. She said, 'do you think you will be serious, Faustina?' and Mom, I said, 'of course!'. This is the best thing that could happen to me."
